

President's Report 1971

A bright start to the year was overshadowed by the untimely death of enthusiastic Member Colin Shepherd. Colin's death left a large hole in our Club and as the anniversary of his death draws near, thought should be given to just how valuable Members who make the effort are to any Club. A fund was set up, and a beautiful Trophy was obtained, to be given each year to the Clubman of the Year, at Calcundra. We trust that this Trophy would be the type of Memorial Colin would have preferred.

Our first Rally for 1971 was a Treasure Hunt organized by Rally Director Frank DeJonge and was a test of our flora and fauna knowledge. Mary Cairncross Park was chosen for the lunch stop and a delightful day was enjoyed by all.

For Easter the Club was invited by the Q.V.V.A. to attend their Kankanya, and several Nambour Members made the trip.

A fortnight after Kankanya several members also attended the $B_*V_*A_*C_*$ two day Rally at the old Deagon Race Course.

March 28th was the date of the Colin Shepherd Memorial Rally. Fourteen vehicles turned out for a picnic day and the Memorial Trophy was presented by Colin's Mother to Graeme Pettigrew, the Clubman of the Year.

Frank DeJonge organized a good days outing to Bribie Island and this was our longest distance event of the year. Six cars turned out for this event and it proved a real success.

Ouring the past eighteen months our Club has been directly involved with the formation of the Council of Combined Clubs, and through this association was directly involved with the organization of the Queens Birthday Rally at Kingaroy. Our section of the Rally organization was the Gymkhana programme at the Kingaroy Showgrounds and this went off without a hitch. Peter Sharpe did a marvellous job as commentator of the event and a large crowd turned out to see the cars.

Sixteen cars turned out in June for our Annual Concours d'Elegance and it proved just what a fine selection of Cars we are ammassing. The standard of our restoration has improved over the year and we can hold our own at any Interclub competition.

During the year we were invited to several Functions, including the Yandina Centenary - the Kenilworth Golden Jubilee and the Chevallum School Jubilee. All these Functions gave us an ideal opportunity to show the Flag and gain a little Goodwill.

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As September drew near, plans were well in hand for our Motorkana. I cannot speak too highly of our members who pitched in to make this the Rally of the Year. 140 odd Car contestants go to make a huge event that requires considerable organization. The untiring efforts of our Members made the Rally the success it was. The Antique Car Club of Nambour's "Motorkana" has become the milestone by which other Rallies are judged. 1971 was our third Motorkana and as they say, "The third time proves it".

Our special thanks must go to T.M.Bourke, Castrol, and the other sponsors who made the whole event possible. It was largely due to the success of this event that it was decided to promote a weeks National Hub Tour on the Sunshine Coast for 1972. Our sponsors are convinced that we are the club for the job and with your co-operation 1972 will be the year when our Club reaches heights never before thought possible for a country Club.

Our final two rallies for the year were a Picnic Day in October, when we entertained the Sundale Residents, and the Saloon Car crowd at Wappa Falls and our Gymkhana at Muller Park, in November.

The October Rally was a quiet day after Motorkana, but proved most enjoyable for those who turned up. The Saloon Car boys were quite amazed at our performance. After a few laps we journeyed up to the dam for a picnic lunch.

Our Muller Park Gymkhana was set down as a day for Lady contestants for a beautiful Trophy donated by Mrs. Maureen Kelly. The Boys were not left out and a good day was enjoyed by all.

My special thanks go to Rally Director Frank for a Year of most enjoyable events.

However, looking back on the years events, perhaps the most important step the Club made was the production of a Magazine. Keeping Members informed is the best way to ensure success and we trust that "Auto Antics" has done this. Sure enough we had our problems, but I feel we can look forward to bigger and better things for 1972. I would like to thank Graeme Pettigrew, John Page and others who helped with "Antics" production.

1971 is near its end and I trust that all members have gained pleasure and enjoyment from the Club during the past twelve months. I shall take this opportunity to wish you and your families all the best for Christmas and the New Year and many happy miles of Antique Motoring.

DID YOU KNOW ?...... In 1894 Elwood Haynes built his single cylinder Buggy type car. In 1898 he formed the Haynes Apperson Automobile Co. in Kokomo Ind. The two men separated in 1902 and continued on their separate ways. In 1904 the Haynes cars were Two and Four Cylinder with sliding gear transmission and shaft drive. Only Four Cylinder engines were made between 1905 and 1913. In 1915 Electric gear change was standard on the larger chassis. In 1916 a change to a 12 cylinder 5.8 litre engine was made, and was manufactured through to 1922. A five seater sedan in 1925 cost \$2,300. Body styles were conservative though a Special Speedster with wire wheels and attractive styling was introduced in 1921. This quite famous make went the way of many cars during the great depression.



DESCENDING HILLS ON A TRICAR.....reprinted from "HINTS" 1911

"If the slope be imperceptible, run the engine in top gear well throttled down, exactly as you would on a motorcycle. If the slope be just steep enough to coest down, declutch and switch off engine at top, leaving gear lever in top notch, but on no account in neutral. Hold the clutch out firmly with the foot; nearing the bottom switch on again, set the levers as for a handle start...except that air need not be quite shut off, and very gently let the clutch in. If the clutch is let in suddenly, the back tyre will be scraped, and the tricar may swerve. A valve lifter is a great convenience on a tricar and saves the clutch unnecessary work.


If slope is dangerously steep or twisty remember a runaway tricar is an almost impossible vehicle to dismount from. Therefore, approach the brow at a crawl, and get in first gear just before commencing descent. Take the clutch out, and then, even if the brakes fail altogether, the machine may be safely taken down, and can probably be stopped on any gradient by simply letting the clutch in again.

Care must be taken to slow engine and machine very considerably before changing to lowest gear."

"COTTER HOLE ALIGNMENT —— File a slot in the end of a bolt or stud in which a cotter hole has been drilled to show its location. This will speed assembly time when going back together."


